Graced from page 9 sings his 11th Dayton Opera role as the rich and handsome Baron, Violetta's main "sugar daddy." The party includes our Artists in Residence in important comprimario roles; Courtney McKeown, Philippe Pierce and Brandon Hood make their main stage debuts. We wait until Act II to hear Megan Bell in her debut as Annina, Violetta's maid. Ben Smolder is a real success story. He delighted as Dick Deadeye in "Pirates." Now, he reemerges as the doctor in "Traviata." Quite a transformation from scurvy sailor to medical doctor.

The second act contains another dose of great music. Chad, as Alfredo, opens the act from his rural love nest singing one of the greatest tenor aria/cabaletta scenes in opera, "De' miei bollenti spiriti" and "O mio rimorso." He sings as if he owns the scene. His declaration, "Io vivo quasi in ceil", "I live almost in heaven" seems perfectly believable.

The paradise comes crashing to an end when Alfredo's father appears. The huge voice and pow-

erful stage presence of Daesan No makes his debut as Germont unforgettable. His selfish goal is to persuade Violetta to give up her love for Alfredo.

He sings expressively about his angelic daughter, a spoiled brat, who will be jilted by her fiancée, also a spoiled brat, if there is a blot of scandal on her family. Violetta is that blot. He manages to gain respect for Violetta but wins his battle to reclaim his son.

The rest of the opera, filled with more great music and singing, brings down the curtain on the tragic romance. The total effect - Maestro Patrick Reynolds in his brilliant operatic debut at the podium, Jeff Powell's chorus, and the artistry of the Dayton Philharmonic orchestra - made more "Bankston Magic."

Dayton Playhouse's *The Miracle Worker*

Dayton Playhouse mounted the challenging play, *The Miracle Worker*, by William Gibson. The story is of Helen Keller and Annie Sullivan, her teacher who rescued her from blind and deaf oblivion.

The production, now unfortunately over, was visually perfect. The amazing set by Chris Harmon was central to the forceful drama. Fine acting by Charity Farrell as Annie and charming 5th grader Claire Warnecke as Helen in the most demanding roles made the play compelling. The supporting actors - Wendi Michael, Geoff Burkman, ShaDonna Crosby and Cynthia Karns were most convincing.

The direction by Jennifer Lockwood made the most of the set and drama. Some of the blocking caused a loss of vocal clarity, but the story was well told and well understood.
