

Jay Haverstick – a life worth emulating

The Uphoff family was deeply saddened to learn of the death of a good friend, Jay Haverstick, this past week. His love of the restaurant business and his success in this career was how we became acquainted decades ago. He was the type of local leader in his field and in his chosen profession that makes all Oakwood High School graduates proud of their fellow alum—for him the Class of 1958.

Harriet and I ate at his establishment in the Hyde Park area of Cincinnati back in the 1970s. Even though I was the Dean of WSU's Lake Campus and we lived in St. Marys, OH, my 40th birthday in 1977 was celebrated at his Yankee Tavern on St. Rt. 725 (a motel is now located there).

Then in 1979 when we

moved back to Dayton, the house we selected for our new home turned out to have been the boyhood home of Jay and his two brothers. Built by his father to be their family home, the four males and their spouses enjoyed a Sunday evening coffee and dessert with us as they reminisced about their own times living in this home.

In 2001, Jay became the president of the Ohio Restaurant Association just as I became the president of the Ohio School Boards Association. We used to joke that he was leading the state in feeding the mouths while I fed the minds! His love of photography and his knowledge of wines were two of his widely acknowledged talents.

When he opened Jay's in the Oregon District downtown, he helped bring new vitality and life to the center city. When he brought his daughter, Amy, into the business and gave her more and more leadership responsibility, he was building for a future that would hopefully go beyond himself.

My 70th birthday was a din-

ner at Jay's with Oakwood's Superintendent Dr. Mary Jo Scalzo and Treasurer Kevin Philo and their spouses. As always dining at Jay's was a pleasure for sure!

Last fall his '58 class celebrated their 50th graduation anniversary and had some very good times together in Jay's Seafood on 6th Street. Several times he shared with me how much he enjoyed the reunion and hosting many of his classmates at the restaurant. That same restaurant has hosted a FREE Christmas dinner for the homeless and poverty fellow citizens for a number of years. Last December about 500 folks were served with dozens of his friends helping out as servers, etc.

Yes, Jay Haverstick has a record of which all of us connected with Oakwood High School can be proud. His life has reflected well on all of us and he has given us - a model of a person who is good in his business, loves photography, and believes in serving others. We would all do well to emulate Jay Haverstick.

WWII refugee rides with OSCA during TDIM parade DLM brand reigns at chocolate tasting

The Oakwood Sister City Association (OSCA) was honored with a special guest aboard its float in the That Day In May parade that made the renaissance of our city's global relationships truly meaningful.

Dr. Jean-Pierre Berwald, Professor Emeritus of French from the University of Massachusetts, rode along in OSCA Treasurer Ron Versic's 1959 Chevrolet flatbed truck, celebrating ties with Le Vésinet, France, that date back to World War II. A Jewish refugee from Belgium, Dr. Berwald was five when his family was welcomed by Oakwood's sister city at the beginning of a long and arduous escape from Europe that finally led him to the United States.

Closer to home, the OSCA's

chocolate tasting during the festival on Saturday, May 16, produced some not-so surprising results. Of 177 tasters, the majority preferred the Dorothy Lane Market brand Belgian milk chocolate. Of the dark chocolates, the order followed cocoa per-

centage, with the preferred chocolates containing the least amount of cocoa.
